In this Miscellaneous Petition, the Providence Water Supply Board seeks to recover, by way of a transfer from its Restricted Revenue Reserve, \$836,565.25 for Electronic Transaction fees incurred on behalf of customers from June 2020 to April 2022 plus any fees incurred thereafter until the date of the Commission's decision in this docket. In addition, Providence Water Supply Board seeks to recover, by way of a surcharge, \$741,241 per year on a going forward basis to cover the payment of these fees on an annual basis. The impact on a retail and private fire service customers of the Providence Water Supply Board will be \$0.78 per month.

Included in this filing is pre-filed testimony of the witnesses to be presented by Providence Water, along with supporting schedules and work papers, as required by the Commission's Rules.

PROVIDENCE WATER SUPPLY BOARD'S NOTICE OF FILING OF MISCELLANEOUS PETITION TO RECOVER ELECTRONIC TRANSACTION FEES

The Providence Water Supply Board hereby gives notice that on June 28, 2022, it submitted to the Rhode Island Public Utilities Commission ("Commission") a Miscellaneous Petition to Recover Electronic Transaction Fees in the above captioned docket.

On March 16, 2020, in response to the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic, the Commission opened Docket 5022 and voted to enter an emergency Order related to the COVID-19 pandemic. This Order prohibited utilities from engaging in collection activities such as termination of service, sending past due accounts to collection agencies and sending termination notices. The Order also prevented utilities from charging late fees, interest charges, credit card fees, debit card fees, and ACH fees. Through several subsequent Orders, these various restrictions were relaxed and/or lifted. In particular, at the Commission's November 5, 2021 Open Meeting, it approved an Order allowing utilities to reinstate late fees and interest charges upon thirty days' notice to customers. However, the Commission's November 5, 2021 Order required utilities to continue absorbing electronic transaction fees such as credit card and debit card fees ("Electronic Transaction Fees").

At its November 5, 2021 Open Meeting, the Commission recognized that many utilities, such as Providence Water Supply Board, do not have revenues included in their cost of service to pay Electronic Transaction Fees on behalf of their customers. As such, the Commission allowed any such utility to file for rate recovery of any such fees already incurred, as well as fees it will incur on an ongoing basis, until the utility's next abbreviated or general rate filing.

In this Miscellaneous Petition, the Providence Water Supply Board seeks to recover, by way of a transfer from its Restricted Revenue Reserve, \$836,565.25 for Electronic Transaction Fees incurred on behalf of customers from June 2020 to April 2022 plus any fees incurred thereafter until the date of the Commission's decision in this docket. In addition, Providence Water Supply Board seeks to recover, by way of a surcharge, \$741,241 per year on a going forward basis to cover the payment of these fees on an annual basis. The impact on retail and private fire service customers of the Providence Water Supply Board will be \$0.78 per month. In Providence Water Supply Board's next abbreviated or general rate filing, it will be required to seek approval for any ongoing amount it seeks to pay Electronic Transaction Fees on behalf of its customers, and it will have to demonstrate that the amount it seeks is the "least cost" manner of recovering these fees.

PROVIDENCE WATER SUPPLY BOARD'S MISCELLANEOUS PETITION FOR RECOVERY OF ELECTRONIC TRANSACTION FEES

I. INTRODUCTION

The Providence Water Supply Board ("Providence Water") requests that the Public Utilities Commission ("Commission") grant relief allowing Providence Water to recover credit card, debit card, voice transaction, and related fees ("Electronic Transaction Fees") paid on behalf of its customers pursuant to Orders issued by the Commission in Docket No. 5022.

II. FACTUAL BACKGROUND

As the Commission knows, COVID-19 was first identified at the end of 2019. On January 30, 2020, the World Health Organization ("WHO") declared a Public Health Emergency of International Concern, and on March 11, 2020, WHO declared an international pandemic. This pandemic resulted in lockdowns in the United States and throughout the world.

In response to the pandemic, the Commission opened Docket 5022, and on March 16, 2020, the Commission voted to enter an emergency Order related to the COVID-19 pandemic. This Order prohibited utilities from engaging in collection activities such as termination of service, sending past due accounts to collection agencies and sending termination notices. The Order also prevented utilities from charging late fees, interest charges, credit card fees, debit card fees, and ACH fees.

Through several subsequent Orders, these various restrictions were relaxed and/or lifted. In particular, at the Commission's November 5, 2021 Open Meeting, it approved an Order allowing utilities to reinstate late fees and interest charges upon thirty days' notice to customers. However, the Commission's November 5, 2021 Order required utilities to continue absorbing transaction fees such as credit card and debit card fees.

At its November 5, 2021 Open Meeting, the Commission recognized that many utilities, such as Providence Water, do not have revenues included in their cost of service to pay electronic transaction fees on behalf of their customers. As such, the Commission allowed any such utility to file for rate recovery of any such fees already incurred, as well as fees it will incur on an ongoing basis, until the utility's next abbreviated or general rate filing. Then, in the next abbreviated or general rate filing, any such utility must seek approval of these costs as part of its cost of service in the same manner as any other expense.

III. RELIEF REQUESTED

Providence Water seeks to recover \$836,565.25 for Electronic Transaction Fees incurred on behalf of customers from June 2020 to April 2022, plus any fees incurred thereafter until the date of the Commission's decision in this Docket. In addition, Providence Water seeks to recover \$741,241 per year on a going forward basis to cover the payment of these fees on an annual basis. The impact on a retail and private fire service customers of Providence Water will be \$0.78 per month. In support of this request, Providence Water relies on the testimonies of Nancy E. Parrillo and Harold Smith, which are attached hereto and incorporated herein.

IV. CONCLUSION

For the reasons set forth herein, Providence Water requests that the Commission grant the relief sought herein and all other relief it deems appropriate in the circumstances.

- 4 Q. How long have you been employed by Providence Water?
- 5 A. I have been employed since April of 2015 or 7 years.
- 6 Q. Would you please state your education, background, and professional associations?
- 7 A. I have a Master's Degree in Business Administration with a concentration in Finance from
- 8 Bryant University. I graduated from Wheaton College in Norton, Massachusetts with a
- 9 Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in Economics.
- Prior to joining Providence Water, I was the CFO for the RI Turnpike & Bridge Authority.
- I have also spent 12 years in the water and wastewater sectors as CFO for the MA Water
- Pollution Abatement Trust, which is the name of the Massachusetts State Revolving Fund
- agency, and as CFO for the South Essex Sewerage District, Massachusetts's second largest
- wastewater treatment facility.

- 16 A. I have. I testified in Docket 4571, 4618, as well as the current PW docket Docket 4994. I
- have also testified in front of the Division on several occasions related to borrowings that

- 19 Q. Please explain your duties and responsibilities.
- 20 A. I am responsible for the Finance Department which includes Financial Planning,
- 21 Budgeting, and Regulatory.
- 22 Q. What is the purpose of your testimony?
- 23 A. My testimony is in support of Providence Water's Miscellaneous Petition to recover credit
- card, debit card and voice transaction fees ("Electronic Transaction Fees" or ETF's) that
- 25 Providence Water has paid on behalf of its customers in compliance with orders issued by
- the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) in Docket 5022 Suspension of Service

Service Terminations and Certain Collection Activities During the COVID-19 Emergency. 2 3 Providence Water is looking to recover the fees paid by Providence Water for the period of June 2020 through April 2022, plus the fees incurred after April 2022 until the date of 4 the PUC's decision in this docket. The dollar amount of these fees is \$836,565.25 through 5 April 2022. 6 We are also requesting a surcharge to cover these costs going into the future so that all 7 Providence Water customers will be able to avail themselves of these more convenient 8 9 payment options which in turn improves cash flow to Providence Water. Q. What is the background for this filing? 10 11 A. On January 30, 2020, the World Health Organization (WHO) declared a Public Health Emergency of International Concern related to the outbreak of what was identified as 12 COVID-19. On March 11, 2020, WHO then declared an international pandemic. This 13 declaration resulted in lockdowns throughout the United States and throughout the world. 14 In response, the RI Public Utilities Commission (PUC) voted to enter a emergency order 15 on March 16, 2020 which prohibited utilities from engaging in collection activities 16 including but not limited to termination of service, sending past due accounts into 17 collections, and sending termination notices. The PUC also prohibited the utilities from 18 charging late fees, interest on delinquent accounts, credit card and debit card fees, as well 19 as ACH fees. Over time, through subsequent orders, these restrictions were either relaxed 20 or lifted altogether. 21 In an Open Meeting on November 5, 2021, the PUC reinstated the ability of the utilities to 22 charge late fees and interest on delinquent accounts with a 30-day notice to customers. In 23 that same Open Meeting, the PUC required utilities to continue to absorb credit and debt 24 card as well as ACH fees related to electronic payments. The PUC did recognize that 25 many utilities, such as Providence Water, do not have these charges built into their current 26 rate structures in order to absorb these electronic payment fees. As a result, the PUC 27 allowed that any utility with this issue would be allowed to file for rate recovery of any 28 fees already expended and incurred on an on-going basis until said utility comes before 29

1		the PUC for its next abbreviated or general rate filing. In that next filing, the utility must
2		seek approval of these costs as part of its cost of service/revenue requirement model in the same manner as any other operating cost.
4	Q.	How is Providence Water proposing to recover these fees?
5	A.	Providence Water is proposing to transfer these fees from the Restricted Revenue Reserve
6		Fund. This fund is earmarked to allow Providence Water to petition the PUC to recover
7		lost water sales revenue as a result of shortfalls in consumption. With the PUC's approval
8		of a one-time exception, Providence Water would transfer the dollars expended on
9		electronic transaction fees during COVID under the PUC's emergency order from the
10		Restricted Revenue Reserve Fund to the Operations Fund.
11	Q.	What impact would this one-time exception have on the Restricted Revenue Fund?
12	A.	As of the end of April 2022, the Restricted Revenue Fund had a balance of \$1,070,216.21
13		and is due 2 months of funding in the amount of \$70,836.04 for a total fund balance of
14		\$1,141,052.25. Therefore, if this request is granted, there will still be funds in the
15		Restricted Revenue Fund once the transfer is made.
16	Q.	How does Providence Water plan to cover these fees in the future?
17	A.	As mentioned above, we are requesting that the cost of these fees be collected through a
18		flat-rate surcharge of \$0.78 per month on our retail and private fire service customers. Mr.
19		Harold Smith of Raftelis Financial has calculated this surcharge in his testimony.
20	Q.	Has Providence Water prepared schedules illustrating the impact on future rates
21		that this fee will have going into the future?
22	A.	Yes, we have. Mr. Smith will include this with his testimony.
23	Q.	Ms. Parrillo, does this conclude your testimony?
24	A.	Yes, it does.

- 2 Q. Please state your name and business address.
- 3 A. My name is Harold J. Smith, and my business address is 5619 DTC Parkway, Suite
- 4 850, Greenwood Village, Colorado, 80111.

- 6 Q. By whom are you employed and in what capacity?
- 7 A. I am a Vice President of Raftelis Financial Consultants, Inc. (Raftelis), a consulting
- 8 firm specializing in water and wastewater finance and pricing. Raftelis was established in
- 9 1993 in Charlotte, North Carolina, by George A. Raftelis to provide environmental and
- 10 management consulting services to public and private sector clients. Raftelis is a national
- 11 leader in the development of water and wastewater rates that satisfy local government
- 12 objectives.

- 14 Q. Please describe your educational background and work experience.
- 15 A. I obtained a Master of Business Administration from Wake Forest University in 1997,
- and a Bachelor of Science in Natural Resources from the University of the South in 1987.
- 17 As an employee of Raftelis, I have been involved in numerous projects for public utilities
- 18 including a number of studies involving transition to new rate structures designed to
- 19 address specific pricing objectives. I have also served on engagements involving a wide

- 27 Q. Have you previously testified before any regulatory agencies or in court on utility
- 28 rate related matters?
- 29 A. Yes. I provided testimony for the Providence Water Supply Board ("Providence
- Water") in nine previous rate filings before the Rhode Island Public Utilities
- 31 Commission ("Commission") in Dockets 3578, 3675, 3818, 4025, 4128, 4243, 4355,

- 1 4595 and 4933. I also provided testimony in the Providence Water Supply Board's
- 2 most recent rate filings (Docket Nos. 3832, 4061, 4070, 4406, 4571, 4618 and 4994).
- 3 I also testified on behalf of the Consumer Advocate before the Nova Scotia Utility and
- 4 Review Board (W-HRWC-R-10). I have also provided testimony for the Pittsburgh
- Water and Sewer Authority's (PWSA) first three water (Docket Nos. R-2018-3002645,
- 6 R-2020-3017951 and R-2021-3024773) and wastewater conveyance (Docket Nos. R-
- 7 2018-3002647, R-2020-3017970 and R-2021-3024774) and PWSA's first stormwater
- 8 (Docket Nos. R-2021-3024779) rate filings before the PAPUC.

9

10 Q. Do you belong to any professional organizations or committees?

- 11 A. Yes. I am a member of the American Water Works Association where I am the past
- 12 chairman of the Strategic Management Practices Committee

14 Q. What is the purpose of your testimony?

- 15 A. As detailed in the testimony of Providence Water witness Nancy Parrillo, Providence
- Water is seeking to recover debit card, credit card and automated clearing house (ACH)
- 17 payment fees ("Electronic Transaction Fees") paid on behalf of its customers in
- 18 conformance with Orders issued by the Rhode Island Public Utilities Commission
- 19 ("Commission") in Docket 5022 In Re: Suspension Of Service Terminations And Certain
- 20 Collection Activities During The COVID-19 Emergency. My testimony overviews a
- 21 request to transfer past fees via a transfer from Providence Water's restricted revenue
- 22 reserve and proposes a surcharge to recover these fees until Providence Water's next
- 23 abbreviated or general rate case.

25 <u>II. PROVIDENCE WATER'S MISCELLANEOUS PETITION TO RECOVER</u>

26 <u>ELECTRONIC TRANSACTION FEES</u>

- 27 Q. Can you explain how Providence Water's request to recover Electronic
- 28 Transaction Fees will affect rates?
- 29 A. Yes. Providence Water's petition contains two requests. First, Providence Water seeks
- 30 reimbursement of Electronic Transaction Fees it covered on behalf of its customers from
- 31 June 1, 2020 up to and including the time of the Commission's decision on this

- 1 miscellaneous petition. The amount as of April 2022 is \$836,565.25. Providence seeks to
- 2 withdraw the amount incurred from its restricted Revenue Reserve Fund. As indicated in
- 3 the testimony of Providence Water witness Nancy Parrillo, the current balance of this fund
- 4 (including the remaining two months of funding due) is \$1,141,052.25, or which is more
- 5 than the amount Providence Water is seeking to transfer. Accordingly, this component of
- 6 Providence Water's Miscellaneous Petition will not affect rates. Second, Providence Water
- 7 seeks approval for a surcharge to recover \$741,241 per year to cover Electronic Transaction
- 8 Fees on a going forward basis.

9 10

Q. Have you calculated the amount of the surcharge needed to cover Electronic

11 Transaction Fees on a going forward basis?

- 12 A. Yes, I have. The surcharge amount was calculated by dividing the anticipated annual
- expense for electronic payments by the annual number of retail customer bills (residential,
- 14 commercial, industrial and private fire service lines) to arrive at a monthly surcharge
- amount of \$0.78 per bill. To determine the projected annual expense, I calculated the
- 16 compounded average monthly growth rate from June 2020 to April 2022. On average, this
- expense has grown 3.53% per month over that time. The growth in the expense is
- 18 attributable to an increase in the use of the electronic payment methods by Providence
- 19 Water customers.

20

- 21 I applied the calculated average growth rate (3.53%) over the next 12 months (May April)
- 22 to determine an annualized amount (\$741,241). Dividing this number by the number of
- retail bills (954,996 in Docket 4994), yields a monthly surcharge of \$0.78. Schedule HJS-
- 24 1 and Schedule HJS-2 show the calculation of the average growth rate, the annualized cost
- and surcharge calculation.

26

- Q. Why has Providence Water chosen to recover these costs through a surcharge
- 28 instead of including these costs in a cost of service analysis and increasing rates to
- 29 recover these costs?
- A. A surcharge is the most effective way of ensuring that the electronic payment expense
- 31 will be recovered in an appropriate manner. The other option would be to include the

- 1 electronic payment expense in Providence Water's revenue requirements and use the cost
- 2 of service model to calculate the rates needed to recover these expenses through rates.
- 3 However, given the nature of this expense, it would be recovered through the monthly
- 4 service charge which was set by the Commission at a level that is below the indicated cost
- 5 of service with the balance of these costs being recovered through the retail volume
- 6 charge.1

7

- 8 Under the current service charge rate design approach (where the charge is limited, shifting
- 9 cost recovery to the retail volume charge) allocation of these costs using the cost of service
- model would result in some of these costs being recovered on a volumetric basis. However,
- the electronic payment fees themselves are fixed and are not based on customer volumes,
- or the size of a customer's bill. Accordingly, in my opinion, a flat surcharge per month is
- 13 the most appropriate way to recover these costs. By contrast, incorporating these costs into
- 14 the cost of service model would imply an increase in the service charge, which—as noted
- 15 above—is already set below cost of service. I believe such a modification would be best
- addressed along with all of the other components of Providence Water's cost of service in
- the context of an abbreviated or general rate filing.

Q. How will Providence Water ensure that the proposed surcharge does not over or

20 under recover the costs associated with electronic payments?

- 21 A. Providence Water is proposing to perform an annual "true-up" that will involve transfers
- 22 to and from the restricted Revenue Reserve Fund. In the event the revenue generated by
- 23 the surcharge exceeds the electronic payment expense an amount equal to the difference
- 24 between the revenue and expense will be deposited in the Revenue Reserve account. If the
- 25 annual expense related to electronic payments is greater than the revenue generated by the
- 26 surcharge, Providence Water would withdraw the amount of the difference from the
- 27 Revenue Reserve account.

¹ During Docket 4994, the Division proposed, and Providence Water accepted, a cap of 1.75x the overall revenue increase for the monthly service charge. This was formalized in the amended settlement agreement dated August 25, 2020. The Commission approved this agreement in Order No. 23928 and the service charges have been set below cost of service since that time.


