
Built in 1897, this Victorian style 2 room schoolhouse was added to the National Register of Historical Places in 2006. The

Buck Hill is 1,777 acres, primarily forest land with some wetland area and agricultural land. The Department of Fish and Wildlife maintains a wildlife marsh (approximately 30.7 acres) which serves to attract waterfowl, furbearers such as muskrat, and other wetland dependent birds.

Sheldon Whitehouse gets cookies for healthcare, castigated for Burrillville Sheldon Whitehouse gets cookies for healthcare, castigated for Burrillville By Steve Ahlquist on July 19, 2017

Indivisible Rhode Island came to praise Senator Sheldon Whitehouse, not to bury him. They brought a plate full of cookies and were sincere in their thanks over Whitehouse's efforts to preserve the Affordable Care Act from yet another Republican-led assault. But even as George Carvalho, state director of Whitehouse's office, received heartfelt gratitude (and cookies!) for 90 percent of the Senator's work, constituents dominated the meeting with criticism of Whitehouse's failure to make a public statement against Invenergy's \$1 billion fracked gas and diesel oil burning power plant planned for the forests of Burrillville.

The discussion began, with praise for Whitehouse's leadership on climate change in the United States Senate. A mom told Carvalho that both her kids "continue to be very concerned about the environment, as I am too, and we want to thank the Senator for his continued support on environmental issues because my son wants to be a marine biologist and he'd like for there to be something to study."

This led to a woman asking if the Senator had seen Before the Flood (2016), a Leonardo DiCaprio narrated documentary about climate change. Carvalho noted that Whitehouse had met with DiCaprio about the issue.

The woman said, "I feel we are beyond..." before she was at a loss for words.

"The tipping point, yeah," said Carvalho as the room fell into a temporary silence.

"On the environment," said Narragansett resident and Indivisible Rhode Island member Jan O'Kelley, "just to begin with, I went out canvassing for Senator Whitehouse, right from the very first election for the Senate. I totally support him but I have some real real concerns. Not about him, but the impact of this one particular thing I'm going to say will have on him.

"There are a number of people in Rhode Island that call themselves progressives and they are progressive Democrats who have one issue, it seems to me, and only one issue of great importance and that's the Burrillville Power Plant and it really frightens me and disturbs me to

She continued, "I mean, we've all defended him. He's a United States Senator, he's not a state senator, it's a local issue but he has to do something to appease those people. Because they kind of think he's, in a way, almost a hypocrite." "Yeah, I know," said Carvalho.

"And when I talk to this one particular fellow who kind of puts out a lot of this very well written and substantiated literature on him," continued O'Kelley, "I say, 'What you're doing is, you're hurting our great Senator who's doing so much for us in Washington.'

"I'm afraid. You hear about the Judge [Robert Flanders] who may run in the primary in Rhode Island who has probably a lot of credibility in Rhode Island. I'm worried that people are going to hold the Senator's lack of a position of Burrillville against him and not vote for him.

"Whitehouse's lack of a position on Burrillville is damaging the Senator's reputation. Really get that message to the Senator. It's so

Another woman agreed. "Whitehouse needs to lay the groundwork for a position against Burrillville. He can't just announce this near the end of the campaign when it's too late. He has seen some erosion of his support because of this."

"I've felt that too actually," said a third woman. "They are very passionate and people are getting the feeling that Senator Whitehouse is ignoring them."

Steven Belaus, another Indivisible Rhode Island member from Narragansett, said, "Two months ago I heard people lay this message out to the Senator and he said, 'Yup, I hear you, but...'"

Carvalho shook his head. "We haven't changed our position. It's a state issue..." Moans and groans from those in the room.

"You understand that from our point of view that's an inadequate response?" asked Belaus.

"Can't you have some sort of meeting with these folks?" asked O'Kelley.

"We have met with them..." said Carvalho.

"My concern is that he's not hearing the message," said Belaus. "We need to see that he's movable on this issue. It will certainly dim my enthusiasm for the Senator."

"We can't afford to lose him as a Senator, especially such a champion of the environment. Can't he just say something?" asked a woman, "Can't he just say that he's against it?"

"We've never gotten involved in state level legislation," said Carvalho. "We've never gotten involved in state regulations. The only thing, if we were to get a call on a constituent issue, then we would call over to the Department of Health or something like that and ask that they call back but we've never weighed in on State issues. We just don't have jurisdiction."

A man who had so far been silent spoke up. "I'm sorry, that is just not a good response. It's a national issue with national problem with one particular site, Burrillville. To say it's a local issue is just- illogical.

"It's a local manifestation of a national problem. He's not weighing in on something that's happening in his own state that has national impact."

"It's like the Mayor of Cranston, Allan Fung, saying health care is not a local issue," noted O'Kelley. "He just said that in the last few days."

"Does the Senator ever talk to Governor Gina Raimondo about issues like Burrillville because they are of state and national importance?" asked a woman.

"They haven't had a discussion on [Burillville] that I am aware of," answered Carvalho.

"I just want to know who's toes is he afraid to be stepping on if he says he's against the plant?" said the woman. "Why is he so reluctant?"

"It's just not what we do..." answered Carvalho.

"Well, maybe what he does needs to change because we don't want to lose him as our Senator," said the woman.

At this point I interjected. Normally I try to be quiet and listen, and I had demurred when asked to speak earlier in the conversation. relate the following with my apologies.

I relate the following with my apologies.

"He does speak about Narragansett Bay. That's a local issue," I said. "He's constantly speaking about the Bay. Nationally, locally, he talks about the Bay all the time. He doesn't talk about Burrillville. So people in Burrillville necessarily believe there are two different standards at work here."

"Why does he resist this so much?" asked a woman. "I've been to meetings, and I'm sure others have as well, where this issue is brought up and we try to defend him on his position, but I think he is being foolish. If there are people who are unwilling to vote for him because of this... we can't lose our Senator.

"There has to be a way that he can show his commitment to the environment and show his commitment to a [power plant approval] process that isn't so fraught- people don't believe that this process is on the level.

"We know that Senator Whitehouse is on the level, so we need his leadership. There has got to be a way that he can support the environment and Burrillville."

A man observed, "What makes it so strange is that he does speak about the environment, big time, and yet- Burrillville is symbolic, if

"At the last town hall solar was brought up as an alternative, and his response was 'well, there's not enough open area in Rhode Island." If that's not a subtle backing of the Burrillville Power plant... That's saying there's a reason why the power plant is useful."

I jumped in again, unable to help myself now. "I should also point out that in Massachusetts national level representatives such as Representative Joseph Kennedy III came out against the Rehoboth compressor station and now that project is [on hold]. Kennedy didn't say, 'That's a local issue.' And Rehoboth is a pretty conservative area, it's not exactly a hotbed of progressivism."

"I live in Bristol," said a woman, "but the fact that Whitehouse won't speak out in this one area and his answers on Burrillville are very vague and unsatisfying, says to me he has some sort of personal financial interest..."

"No, not at all," said Carvalho.

"He's evading for a reason," said a man. "He's hiding behind 'it's a local issue."

"I don't think we are evading," said Carvalho. "You don't like the answer, but that doesn't mean we are evading the question."

"Understand that that answer is going to get the Senator un-elected," said a woman.

"I understand," said Carvalho.

"He needs to do whatever he can to stay in the Senate right now," said a woman.

"This is not a NIMBY issue," said another, "This is throughout the state and it should be national."

"The Dakota pipeline isn't a local issue," said a woman, "Nothing that happens with energy right now is a local issue."

"We'd all like Senator Whitehouse to say something like that, and yet he won't say anything at all..."

"Message heard," said Carvalho.





This is my comment just posted after the "Sheldon Whitehouse gets cookies, etc..." RI Future article posted below. The comment is a reply to an earlier comment by one Barry Schiller: "Barry, I think you're correct that losing Senator Whitehouse over his reluctance to criticize the power plant would be absurd. But, as we learned in spades in November, these are absurd times, and the power plant is proposed for an utterly absurd site that overthrows the norms, and indeed the law and regulations, that have governed land-use decisions for nearly a generation in this state. This makes power plant opponents---and their ranks are very large now---see red. A lot of them will vote red. too, just to spite the Senator, if the power plant is approved and we see splashed across the media cranes in the air over the state forests next to which the plant will be built. So that's the risk both he and we all run regards control of the US Senate. The smart thing for Whitehouse to do would be to follow the Governor's lead. (see GoLocal three weeks ago,) and issue a mea culpa to power plant opponents for his off-repeated declarations that the EFSB siting process is a fair and thorough one. If he doesn't, it is only a matter of time before Republicans discover this embarrassing issue and put some money behind it, adding fuel to the red flames in 2018. And as for the effect of him dissing the power plant, yes, his words would not be decisive, but they would be far from insignificant. And aren't we concerned about a Democrat retaining the Governorship, too? Gina is absolute toast if this power plant gets approved. That is guaranteed. That is why she issued the mea culpa. So stopping the power plant is very much a crucial issue, both here and nationwide, for Democrats. There are only 16 Democrat governors left in the whole country. And think what that will mean if the trend continues through the 2020 census, and the Republicans get yet another chance to genymander their way to permanent power in our national government. So... Message to the Senator: Do something about the power plant. Join the Governor and issue a mea culpa. In Burrillville. Perhaps at the Pulaski Park Recreation Area---beautiful setting, part of the larger George Washington Wildlife Management Area on whose northeast property line those cranes will be rearing their photogenic heads.



Finally, the Ocean State Power-Clear River Energy Center connection is exposed to daylight. The fact of the matter is: the Energy Facilities Siting Board has already considered the Invenergy power plant site, AND REJECTED IT. It all happened in 1987-88 when the EFSB--ACTING RESPONSIBLY---ordered that a formal Environmental Impact Statement of the Ocean State Power project be conducted by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. The "Ocean State Power Project, Federal Energy Regulatory Commission Final Environmental Impact Statement, volumes I & II" can be found on-line and read by all. The quote by DEM biologist, Chris Raithel, (who is still employed by DEM) can be found in Volume II, "Letters and Correspondence." It is about time that this information reached the Rhode Island public. THIS IS THE INFORMATION INVENERGY DESPERATELY WISHED TO KEEP SECRET: Because of its location in the midst of one of the most sensitive forest ecosystems remaining in southeast New England. the Ivenergy site, when it was proposed as an alternative to the OSP "preferred" site in eastern Burrillville six miles away, was REJECTED. Go to the docs (volume II) and read the comments, especially from the US Fish & Wildlife Service, whose criticism of the then called "Buck Hill Road" site is absolutely scathing.




Bill Eccleston The flaw is in the Engergy Facility enabling legislation. It does not spell out the process. The language is too broad. In the OSP case, it chose to order an Environmental Impact Statement. In the Invenergy case, it chose not to. In any reform of the EFSB---and that's being considered---an EIS by an authority competent to do one should be mandatory for any energy project. Also mandatory should be the FERC EIS process which mandated the consideration of alternative sites. The OSP process started with a list of 82! That was quickly whittled down to fewer than a dozen that required any kind of detailed study. And the OSP EIS was not lengthly; only took 18 months. We are two years down the road with Invenergy now.





The plant will use upwards of 740,000 gallons of water a day (peak) when many communities locally and nationally are increasingly in drought. Water, oil, and ammonia will be delivered from hundreds of tanker trucks down small country roads past schools and homes.



Only three percent of the Earth's water is fresh water, but most of that is glacial. Less than one percent is groundwater available to us as drinking water.

Power plants in the US are major consumers of water, accounting for 48% of fresh water usage.


New England has already been experiencing one of the worst droughts in history.






Would you want this in YOUR backyard?

DEM PURCHASES CRITICAL 189-ACRE PARCEL IN BURRILLVILLE, CONNECTING OVER 7,000 ACRES OF PROTECTED LAND

OVIDENCE - The Department of Environmental Management has acquired 189 acres of d in Burrillville from the Boy Scouts of Rhode Island. The parcel is situated adjacent to r 7,000 acres of state-preserved land. To the north of the property lies the 2,084-acre ck Hill Management Area, and to the south is the 5,203-acre George Washington/Durfee Management Area. The property also abuts Connecticut's Quaddick State Forest to the st. This property is considered among the highest priority conservation parcels in the e, and the high concentration of protected land in the area allows for increased habitat tection with minimal disturbance.

The property acquired by DEM is connected to larger conservation areas that surround it, providing increased land protection in the northwest corner of the state.



The State's contribution to this conservation project from voter approved bond funds accounted for less than 10 percent of the total purchase price. The total cost of the acquisition was \$900,000. DEM provided \$83,000 from state Open Space Bond funds, \$367,000 was provided by a federal wildlife incentive grant from the US Fish and Wildlife Service, and \$450,000 came from grant funds provided by The Nature Conservancy and The Champlin Foundations.


e land features a myriad of uncommon species and habitats of both plants and animals. In the species include locally-common conifers such as White Pine and Eastern Hemlock and a species such as American Larch and Black Spruce, which are typically associated with them forest habitats. Many rare plants have been identified on the property including mmon Oak Fern, Round-leaved Orchid, One-flowered Pyrola. Identifying and protecting se species helps ensure that diverse habitats such as that of the Burrillville property are tained.

Preservation of the property strongly aligns with the state's Comprehensive Wildlife Conservation Strategy, which aims to identify and conserve those species in greatest need for conservation while retaining a holistic view of all wildlife within the state. Croff Farm Brook runs through the property and fosters an array of aquatic habitats that are not typically found in Rhode Island. The Croff Farm Brook area contains springs which are considered uncommon, isolated habitats, as well as several rare species identified by the conservation strategy as Species of Greatest Conservation Need.


